Getting Adequate Returns For Our Investment

PSALMS: 2:8. In the business world we are very much concerned whether our investments are bringing us satisfactory returns for time and money spent; if they are not satisfactory, we endeavor to turn to some other fields for investment.

We, the Brethren in Christ Church, have invested for fifty years in Foreign Mission Work. Our returns and possessions are testimonies to what has been coming in during this half century of giving out. Actual figures are small facts within themselves. To say there are twenty-six hundred communicants in Africa with nearly as many in the enquirers' class, who are prospects for the future, and between one and two hundred in India, is merely indicative. We still have in addition over five thousand Sunday School pupils and six or seven thousand in the secular schools, to look forward for returns in years to come.

Bishop S. G. Engle years ago, having figured perhaps one half million dollars were spent up to his time in the work. we

perhaps could conservatively say a million dollars have been invested across the seas adding an amount in addition to what our records show, the private offerings and that of which no account has been kept. We also have our city Mission work to include in the various cities where through the years the gospel light has gone forth to souls in darkness. I think as we look at this we can surely say it is encouraging to see what the Lord has given us.

We would not forget the many who lie beneath the sod awaiting the first resurrection of the just who figure in the returns on our investments. If one soul is worth more than the whole world, we will conclude we have surely a paying investment to draw from. Surely Mission work pays in this life, and there will still be the greater rewards for all the faithful to reap in eternity.

It would only seem right to say a Spiritual church is a Missionary Church and where there is not an outlet in Missionary

channels, stagnation is the result. I have had a personal conviction that congregations should give more to Home and Foreign Missions than what is necessary to run our home work or local church.

Protestant mission work in the Philippines is the same age as our work in Africa, and it is easily seen in the Orient where Missions are established that there is a new way of life manifested among the people in their homes and also in their conduct.

A rough estimate of the cost of the last war has been put at 1,117 billion dollars. China's war is not included in this, neither civilian losses—the human cost of 22,060,000 killed besides the millions crippled and injured for life. I wonder what the results would be if a million born again Christians, backed up by prayer and necessary funds to carry on Mission work, could be sent into these needy fields. The gospel heals, restores and unites, and does not leave a pathway of destruction and sorrow. Such a subject would only strengthen nations served, for the Bible declares "Righteousness exalteth a nation but sin is a reproach to any people."

Statisticians tell us that at the present rate of increase the world will double its population in ninety years. Can we imagine a present population in the world of two and one fourth billion souls with only a

minority group who know Jesus as a personal Saviour. The question arises, have we done our best in spreading the gospel light. I do not believe the Brethren in Christ church has tapped all our resources in giving; perhaps only half of our members give their regular tithe and offerings in a systematic way. Could we not double our efforts with the other half?

When Jesus met the woman at the well of Samaria and told her His water of life would be in her a well of springing water, did He mean it would only give her individual blessing through the Spirit, or did He not include the overflowing of that life which would bless others. This was shown by her immediately returning to the city and inviting others to come see and hear Him.

We sometimes quote the message of Jesus in reference to "Out of his innermost being shall flow rivers of living water." Is this overflow wasted or is this what goes out to others through the channels of blessing in missionary work? I was told by one of the mission workers in the Philippines that one old chief among the head hunting tribes accused him by saying "If you would have come sooner and told the love of Jesus so many heads would not have been taken." This immediately opens a field for thought as to what all has happened because of the too frequent delay in opening mission fields.

Our estimate of true values vary as our interests. Some may look upon the heathen as a poor investment and unworthy of our interests. But are they not included as well as we in Calvary's offering? The Psalmist in our text says "Ask of me and I shall give thee the heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession." I think God is holding out a rich inheritance for the Church to claim in possessions which would bring eternal rewards. An inheritance is usually obtained by proper relationship. So let us not overlook this offer to which the Church can lay claim.

American women have more liberties, and freedom than of any other nation. In some lands women are yet simply slaves and looked upon as being far inferior to men. This difference is due undoubtedly through the influence of an open Bible enjoyed here many centuries.

Missionary background is manifested in the begining of the new Testament. John the Baptist, the fore runner, preached the doctrine of repentance, thus preparing the way for Jesus. Then Jesus taught, "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest." Along with the broad "whosoever" in His invitations to souls, He chose twelve disciples, then seventy and one hundred and twenty, giving them the great commission, "Go ye." The apostle Paul made three missionary journeys and established churches. So from these beginings there has been a continuation through Missionary Boards to the present time. The work has commanded a large task in translating and distribution of the Bible. We are told there are possibly twenty-five hundred different dialects, and up to date a little over one thousand translations at least in part have been put in readable form for all people.

We are made to thank God that the Brethren in Christ Church has sent forth well over one hundred self sacrificing workers who counted their lives not dear unto themselves, who bid farewell to all that was offered in the homeland to go to Africa and India through the half century just passed. Some of these have passed on and are awaiting the trumpet sound. Their lives are a challenge for others to fill the ranks and carry on till Jesus comes.

As we make this report of the activities of the Chicago Mission during the past months we are again reminded of the goodness and faithfulness of our Heavenly Father.

Revival services were conducted in November, when Bro. Jesse Steckley of Ontario was the speaker. His timely messages on the book of Revelation were very sobering and left a deep impression upon our people. In March Bro. Joel Carlson was used of God in a special series of meetings. About twenty five young people and children sought the Lord, as well as several adults, and we believe real work was done in their hearts. We were glad to see new faces in most every service. These brethren brought real blessing to our congregation.

Visitors. Among many, we mention Bro. Jesse Lady, Mrs. Gordon Mainland of Mich. who was a former convert of the Mission in earlier years. Ernest M. Frey formerly of Calif. spent a Sunday with us. We wish to acknowledge and thank Bro. Frey for the kind gift of a set of stainless steel kitchen ware, which is much appreciated by the cooks. We were told the more it is used and cleaned the brighter it will shine and we saw a spiritual lesson in these instructions. It seems we can hardly adjust ourselves to the fact that Sr. Sarah is not in the Mission home. We remember her fervent prayer life, her unselfish devotion to others and to the cause which lay so near to her heart. Others have laboured and we only have entered into their labours. As a Mission family we ask your prayers that we may serve as faithfully as they.

Almost the last moment it was decided to have a Watch Night service. Not having time to arrange for a program, we were wondering just how we could best spend the time till midnight. The meeting was no sooner started till the Spirit of God fell, and almost before we knew it, it was 12:00 P.M. Shouts of praise and thanksgiving, and prevailing prayer was the theme of the service.

On January 5, the Gospel Team from Messiah Bible College stopped at the Mission for lunch; they were just returning from a week's gospel tour through the mission field in Kentucky. The group consisted of Alice Grace Hostetter, Vera Garis, Mary Jane Heisey, Martha Mae Long, Hess Brubaker, Pete Stern, Paul Hostetler and Frank Kipe.

January 6, Pres. C. N. Hostetter, Jr., from Grantham stopped at the Mission for a few hours to interview a young couple that expect to go into Home Mission work.

On Thursday evening, Jan. 22, Edna Grace Fath and Robert Lowell Wengerd were united in marriage in the Mission. Both of these young people were saved in our tent meeting about four years ago but did not unite with our church till a few months ago. Bro. and Sr. Wengerd are now in the Kentucky Mission field.

On Friday night, Jan. 23, over 400 people packed the Mission Church to listen to the four year old Negro preacher, his name is Samuel Holmes. The young boy read his own scripture and preached about 20 minutes without notes quoting a considerable amount of scripture. The lad is very unusual but hard to understand. The Friend-

ship Baptist Negro Church of Massillon rented our Church for the occasion.

On Sunday afternoon and evening, Mar. 14, the Northern Ohio Young People's Society met at the Mission for spiritual refreshment. The theme of the program was, "Crusade for Christian Service." The topics were as follows, "Preparation for Service," A, "Consecration," B, "Bible Study and prayer," C, "Love for humanity," D, "Zeal," E. The final topic "Challenge for Service" was presented by our guest speaker, Eld. Dale Ulery. The evening service consisted mostly of music and again a message, "Channels for service" by Bro. Ulery.

On Easter Sunday afternoon the Messiah Bible College Chorus gave a program at the Mission to a large crowd.

The last Sunday in November, the Mission staff started a half hour broadcast from 12:30 to 1:00 P.M. over W A N D Canton, Ohio—900 on the dial. We have been on the air every Sunday since. According to recent survey made by the station our program is one of the two best liked programs they have on. The station is now giving us 15 minutes extra free; we are on from 12:15 to 1:00 P.M. This has opened unto us a large field of labor; it is helping our mission work. Many requests come in for prayer. We drove as far as 50 miles to pray for sick people. One woman who was saved was standing on top of a chair on the kitchen table cleaning wall paper when the program was on. At the close of the preaching, we asked people to get on their knees and accept Jesus while we prayed for them; she then came down and knelt by the radio and was saved.

The station we are on operates on only 500 Watts; and we are sorry that not more of the brethren and sisters of our church can get the program. However, we are praying that the way will open up for us to get on other stations, perhaps one in your community. Will you please pray for us and our work and if it be the Lord's will, that the way opens for us to get on other stations. Over twenty years ago the Lord showed me that I would preach on the radio some day. We feel unworthy. The Lord has blessed us with a family that has useable talent, and we want, by God's grace to use it all to the glory of God. All our children except the baby are saved and sanctified and serving the Lord. God forbid that I should boast; we are saying this all to the glory of God. As we look back over the past 22 years since Sister Hostetler and I have been saved and sanctified, we can see the hand of God on our life, and perhaps many times we would have went astray hadn't it been for His hand. We can only say glory to God for His goodness to us, and now at last he led us out into active mission work. We feel so unworthy and unable of this great task of winning souls for His kingdom. We want to thank the Home Mission Board and those of you that have been so nobly standing by us with your prayers, your moral support and some of you with financial support. contact with our kinfolk in our native city. To help make a contribution to the work of the Chicago Mission is an opportunity that we have appreciated, but also a responsibility that we have by no means taken lightly. God has given us some visible fruitage, Praise His worthy Name.

It has been said that some men of old "stained the walls of their study with their prayers." It is not difficult for me to believe this when I can sense here the sweet fragrance of the sainted and sacrificial life of Sr. Sarah H. Bert. One cannot help but marvel that a person could make such an impact upon other lives. Furthermore, that in and through a building where they resided for so many years, they could be so keenly missed. The memory of the Just is blessed.

Personally it is a privilege to carry on one's heart a burden for the lost of earth in today's city life. Here are needy souls—and why shouldn't we go to them with the Bread of Life? Here is good fishing—and who can tell what rare specimen of humanity you may bring into the fold of the Kingdom of God?

Our regular services have continued with a good interest and a fine spirit. Burdened hearts still seek God at an altar of prayer and find sweet peace and power. A class for baptism and church membership has been started. Two of our number completed the sixth and final unit of the Evangelical Teachers Training Course. Our Spring Communion service will take place on May 2.

Week Day Bible School closed on Thursday of Holy Week. This year's effort produced the finest Bible School we have ever had at Harrisburg. A sizeable even attendance carried through the year and the various classes did good work. Out of this group at least eight children were saved in our winter revival. A fine corps of teachers worked together faithfully. Every week Messiah Bible College sent 5 teachers for this work.

Spring housecleaning consumed considerable attention at Messiah Lighthouse Chapel in the past weeks. We were more than grateful for some valued assistance given to us by a band of sweet spirited volunteers from Lancaster County. They dared to share with us for one day some heavy labors, one of the little known aspects of mission life. In our big home, which is something of an institution, the aid they rendered in one day was invaluable to us. God bless them abundantly.

The Lord has greatly helped us in our finances during this past year and we are grateful to Him. But the close of this quarter found us with some accumulating indebtedness. Therefore the Mission had to close the quarter and the fiscal year with a deficit of about \$150.00. Our large items of expense are for heat and for repairs and upkeep of the old building. We are carrying a heavier load today in the upkeep of the building because in the past to all appearances, the most rigid economy was followed in its construction. Now the net result is that today our cost of upkeep is no doubt higher than it should be. The building is not so old in years as some others, but its wear is very noticeable. No doubt its cheaper construction is partly the reason.

But who would say that it isn't worth while when souls are being saved, some are uniting with the church, and many others are being instructed and informed of the way of righteousness?

We are happy for the task, and seek to be faithful to all of our duties. Will you pray for us that with wisdom and courage and love we may carry out the sentiment of the little verse quoted at the beginning of our report which says:

"God help us all to our post to be true,
Tell men the story 'Christ died for you,'
There's so little time, and so much to do."

Stowe Mission, Stowe, Pa.

Ever since the opening of Stowe Mission the Sunday School and one of the preaching services was held on Sunday afternoons. Navajo Mission, Bloomfield, N. M.

Greetings to all, in the blessed name of Jesus.

We approached the end of another three months' period, with hearts full of gratitude

and praise to our Saviour, who has in mercy and Grace, truly verified His promise: "Lo I am with you always, even unto the end of the World." In many ways His helping hand has been with us to strengthen and help.

The evangelistic work has been going forward with considerable interest shown. At present we are holding services regularly each week at three different camps and occasionally at a number of others. At one home there has been manifested a real interest in learning to read the Navajo language. There will be a definite spiritual benefit in making the Scriptures available to them in their own tongue. At another home the father, a middle-aged man who has been helpless for the past few months because of a stroke, manifests much interest in the Scriptures and in the Christian hymns. We believe there is a hunger in his heart for something better than he has known. There has been a desire expressed by others, too, that we visit their homes with the Gospel message. Will you be praying with us for the spiritual awakening of these people?

Some time has been spent in distribution of food and clothing to the very poor among the people. Much gratitude has been expressed for this. However, this phase of the work, as well as the evangelistic, has been rather slow, for a good part of the time the roads were nearly impassible with snow or mud. There was much snow this winter, about four and a half feet at our place, and as it melted the country became a veritable sea of mud. One time on an evangelistic trip, the clutch of the car burnt out pulling through the heavy mud, and we had to walk home about ten miles in the dark. The car stayed where it was for over a week till the mud dried sufficiently that two teams of horses could pull it in to the highway.

During this quarter the mission home was sufficiently finished that we have been able to live in it. This proved a real improvement over our tents, especially when the temperature was down below zero—even going as low as about 20 below zero once or twice. It made our hearts go out in sympathy for some of the Navajo folks we know who have only tents to live in, especially some of the old folks who have no one to care for them. Now that Spring has come again, we hope to take up the building work again, and hope, if the Lord wills, to build a school and meeting house and dormitories for the school children and finish them in time for school this fall. As we mentioned last year, we will welcome any of the Brethren who might have a week or two to spare to the building work here, and we are surely thankful to each of you who helped us in that way last fall and winter.

We appreciate, too, all those who have helped with their means to further this work, and, especially, we thank each one who has been praying for the Salvation of the Navajo People. May the Lord bless you all as you have been a blessing to others is our prayer.

Perhaps we should mention, too, that in the early part of the quarter, as many of you know, Bro. and Sr. Nicholson were in the East visiting some of the churches in the interests of the Navajo Mission work. We would thank each one who helped to make those visits a real time of blessing to us and those who gave money to help with the work. At that time Sr. Rosa Eyster was attending a class in the study of the Navajo

language at Farmington under the auspices of the Wycliffe Bible Translators, and she found it a time of good spiritual fellowship, as well as a great aid to her understanding and use of the Navajo language. We thank the Lord for this privilege afforded Sr. Eyster.

Surely the Lord has been blessing here, and we would, as Samuel, proclaim His goodness, and say "Hitherto has the Lord helped us."

While we were away in the East, Bro. David Engle and his son Loyd stayed at the mission, caring for it and helping with the building and the mission work. We are certainly grateful for their generous contribution of time and work.

To the "Visitor" family:

Since we have not sent in any monthly news items this past quarter, it might be interesting to our readers to have a brief accounts of the happenings in each month.

From the beginning of the new year we began to haul the slab wood we had previously purchased to the mission home. One morning I saw a team and two men loading their sled at a large pile from which I had taken one load the evening before, and since there has been several thefts in the country during the fall and winter my first thought was that someone was stealing slabs, and for a moment I was both frightened and puzzled as how to deal with the situation. Just as I had decided to make them finish their load and then help me load mine, after which both loads would be taken to the home of the would be thieves, I saw that the team belonged to the Jones's (Sr. Pearl Jones's folk) and the men were intending to help me haul wood that day. Their help that day, and on two other days when they helped with the hauling and buzzing wood was of great assistance to us. On the fifth of January a group of men gathered and by nightfall around twelve cords or more of wood were all ready for the stove.

For several weeks we had been thinking of the day when we would have a tooth removed that was imbedded in the jaw bone, and was expected to cause considerable trouble in getting it out. The children were taken by our neighbors, the Logans, who also were going to look after the stock and Sr. Brechbill and I went to Prince Albert on the sixth, and the tooth was removed the following day. To the surprise of everyone, it caused little discomfort, and there was no swelling, and we were able to proceed with the preaching services upon our return as usual. The dentist had estimated that for three weeks the "congregation" would have to lift themselves by their own bootstraps, meaning that we couldn't speak very much for that length of time. His reaction to the way the Lord helped us was this: "You must have a clear conscience." We stayed in Prince Albert two days and enjoyed the change and rest from the daily pressure. Upon our return home we found the house warm and the stoves going, another evidence of the kindness of Mr. Logan.

While in Prince Albert we were reminded again of God's protecting hand. For some time we had been having trouble with the car wanting to shimmy and wander off the road, and so we took it to the garage for a steering gear checkup. It was found that some parts were nearly worn in two, which explained our inability to keep some things adjusted properly, and also was the answer to the troubles we had been having with the car staying in the road. We were able to have everything repaired except one thing; the parts not being on hand. This is the reason for the maintenance expense bill for this quarter being as high as it is.

In spite of blowing snow we used the car to reach Meath Park and Prince Albert until the last day of January. On the last trip to the city, made to take a couple of our people to the dentist, we had to shovel a little snow at one spot, and detour through two fields for a considerable distance because the road was blocked. Often we are able to get through by taking to the fields, and in this case the snow plow had opened a road through the fields. On the last day of January we with another young man went to Meath Park and from there to Paddockwood. While going to Paddockwood the wind came up and before we got home we had shoveled through huge snow drifts for over a mile, been stuck in the snow at one place for two hours or more, routed a man out at one in the morning to

pull the car with his team through the last few drifts between his home and the mission, and finally drove into the garage about two Sunday morning, tired and hungry, and chores still to take care of. Our boy was with us on this trip, and had he not been along, we might have been tempted to leave the car and walk home. The car then would no doubt be there yet, as drifts piled higher and higher that night and the next day. The man, incidentally, refused to accept anything for his assistance.

Sr. Brechbill and the writer have just returned from an overnight trip to the wood camp of Mr. and Sr. Jones, now living about fourteen miles north of us. The trip through the woods at this time of year is most beautiful, but the main purpose of our trip was to bring spiritual encouragement to them, and also to take their mail which now comes to our care. The various opportunities and experiences that come to us may seem commonplace to the "old timers" of this section, but to us it is exciting and makes our work more enjoyable.

A review of the spiritual aspects of the past quarter must not be overlooked. We, both as a mission staff and as individuals, have been through the furnace of fierce opposition, which has naturally caused us some anxiety. The sources of opposition are well known to us, and of course have their fountainhead in the arch enemy of souls. But we are thankful that we long ago cast ourselves on the Lord, and we have committed ourselves to His keeping, and we were frankly astonished as we witnessed the Lord raising up defenders among unbelievers. The prayers and support of our little band has been a never-ending assurance and add to all this the several letters we received from friends miles away who knew nothing of some of the tests we were passing through, telling us that they had been praying for us and felt impressed to write us and tell us of their interests in this mission field. As you continue to pray with us we believe God will continue to answer and we shall be able through the columns of this paper to tell of souls saved and added both to the Body of Christ and to our own beloved church. The trials and tests referred to have seemingly lost their power, and the work is advancing onward, slowly to be sure, and we desire to ask that the brotherhood stand behind us with your prayers.
