Open Doors

SUNDAY, February 6, Dr. Walter A. Maier of the renowned Lutheran Hour, St. Louis, Missouri, made reference in his introductory remarks to a new language that was carrying the program. A radio station that penetrates the Iron Curtain was now broadcasting the message in the Russian language. He then referred to communications that were received and how some of these oppressed peoples are rejoicing in the Gospel Messages they receive through this ministry. Anti-God influences are seemingly working with great fury to close the way for people to hear the Good News, but strange as it may seem, man may think it closed and suddenly God brings it in an-

According to the message to the church in Philadelphia "He that hath the Key of David, openeth and no man shutteth and shutteth and no man openeth." Then He proclaims "I have set before thee an open door." Some things suggest themselves to us concerning this open door:

Some one to Enter

The first thing Jesus did was to enlist recruits. Men who would enter the door,

seize opportunities and be instrumental in the salvation of souls.

"Lift up your eyes and look on the field for they are white" Jesus evidently anticipated a slack response, hence He said, Pray ye, therefore the Lord of the Harvest that He will send forth." Every rural church in the U. S. A. represents an open door. Many of these churches close because love for the Lord, passion for the souls of men and willingness to practice self-denial have been overtaken by popular appeal and the din of city life with all its glamour. The most forceful call that comes originates with the Holy Spirit. In the Lord's work every open door is balanced by a clear call to someone to enter. To pray is our responsibility—to call is the task of the Holy Spirit and the Church.

Money can be Supplied

God's system to finance His work is tithes and offerings. An open door is evidence that the Lord is laying His hand on someone's material wealth to utilize the opportunity at hand. The Lord works just like this: Bishop Carl Ulery, Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board sent a note recently

informing us of a sister who had sent a check of two thousand dollars. It was earmarked for the Santal Work in India. If you have been following the diary, etc. of the Mission Deputation, you will realize how this picture fits together. This field is opening up in India and here in America the Holy Spirit is securing the money to move into the field. The Cause of Christ goes begging, when people grieve the Holy Spirit as he calls for finance to carry on the Lord's work. Again we say — open doors indicate the money is present, if God through the Holy Spirit can secure it.

A Harvest is Ready

Standing on the beach of the Aegean Sea Paul saw a beckoning hand that led him into Macedonia. A harvest was ready there. The Psalmist said, "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him." Fifty years ago Buffalo Mission, Chicago Mission, Rhodesia in Africa and many other places were open doors. Thank God we moved in and thousands of souls have been saved. When the door opens, is the time to move in—every moment of delay robs some soul of eternal bliss and leaves them to the blackness of an endless night.—J. N. H.

a message asking me to come to Prince Albert at once. As soon as possible I left; the night was bitterly cold, as it had been for several days. Having been rushed even before this time, and not feeling too well due to a cold and fatigue, I asked a friend in Meath Park to take me in with his car, and for this kindness we are deeply indebted to Mr. F. J. Sinkiewicz, who refused to accept anything for this trip. We found that our neighbor had passed away about the time I had received the request to come. Another trip the following night in bitter cold was made to bring out members of the family who were gathering in. It was my pleasure to read God's Word and pray with the family several times.

One evening the father and a daughter came to our home and remained for several hours. Both were hungry and wanted to be saved. The following Friday night,

hours. Both were hungry and wanted to be saved. The following Friday night, which was Christmas eve, I went to the home, and while there an altar service developed, with one of the boys being gloriously converted and one of the girls seeking to be saved. The six children asked for the privilege of singing a hymn in the Sunday morning service. It was evident that God was speaking to them and to others.

That evening when I returned from the evening service at Melba, I saw a sled standing in the driveway, and the entire family were in the house. The boys had put the horses in the barn, as they were determined to stay until they were satisfied. One of the girls said to Sr. Brechbill when they came, which was after ten in the evening, "Oh, Mrs. Brechbill! We just had to come; we can't stand it any longer, and we're not leaving until we are saved." Their two small children were put to bed, and we two small children were put to bed, and we knelt around the kitchen table and began to pray. They soon started to confess, and God came down on the scene. In the midst of sighs and tears, shouts of deliverance and trice of ion broke fouth as the two of sighs and tears, shouts of deliverance and cries of joy broke forth as the two girls, then one of the boys received the witness of sins forgiven. Then another boy was saved, and finally the father came to believe. The Lord gave him a real witness later in the morning at his home. One boy is still unsaved, but out of the seven members of this family who were home, six are now saved. There was a real time of old fashioned rejoicing for a little while as we praised God together and compared experiences. Two of the boys had confessions to Two of the boys had confessions to make in the community, and they made make in the community, and they made them, with a good effect resulting. We felt led, since the two girls were soon returning to their homes, to call a special meeting at the church for Monday night. Forty came on short notice, and the family gave their testimonies, and God was there in convict-ing power. At the close of the service five testimonies, and God was there in convicting power. At the close of the service five of the audience raised their hands for prayer. Pray for them; if they seek God and are saved, it will produce a powerful witness in this place for God that perhaps will never be surpassed. God's spirit is faithful, and a number of men are realizing their need. One of the remarkable things about the conversion of this family is that the father formerly opposed the children the father formerly opposed the children being saved, though he wanted them to atbeing saved, though he wanted them to attend church. Last summer he began to come himself. Now he is most interested in seeing his family converted. Two of the girls are married and live outside Saskatchewan. They need your prayers. One daughter was not at home, and for her and her unsaved brother's salvation we are looking to God. What hath God wrought?

Knifley Clinic Report
