The second quarter of this year ushered in the time of the spring breakup which always makes traveling difficult and makes us seek new paths in getting from place to place. We missed a few midweek appointments during this time, and one service in Paddockwood.

We would like to tell you about a couple trips this spring. One Thursday, the last week in April, was the time for the mid-week service in Paddockwood. The roads were in horrible shape; sections of the roadway were cut out by the rushing water. Sr. Brechbill and I set out before dinner with Robin Hood pulling the buggy and reached Paddockwood without trouble. But coming home it was necessary for us to go by way of Sr. Jones's, and two miles out of Paddockwood, and three and one half miles from Jones's, the one rear wheel of the buggy collapsed. The broken section of the tire caught on the body of the buggy in such a way that the wheel slid on the unbroken portion, and the buggy remained on an even keel while we walked. But repeatedly we came to where the water and mud was such we could not get across unless we removed our footwear, and it was too cold for that. We would wait where we were until Robin would catch up with us, climb in the buggy and cross the bad spot, then get out and walk ahead with Robin coming as he chose. In due time we reached Jones's tired and muddy, where we secured another wheel from their discarded buggy, and after supper, set out for home again. Before reaching home we had to travel seven miles in place of four because the snowdrifts still blocked the way ahead, and in the darkness, we ran into a deep wash-out, which threw this writer almost out of the buggy. We had to use some wire to hold the buggy shafts together and we did eventually get home around the hour of twelve.

From the religious viewpoint, we have been faithful in preaching the Word of God, and the various services conducted. At Candle Lake we now have service Tuesday evening instead of Sunday. This switch was made by the united request of the people there. They come out real well there; that is, the women and children. The men do not attend, with two exceptions. We expect each time to see nineteen children, six mothers, and a young lady. Interest in the services seems good, and from the offerings they give us, they appreciate our interest in their welfare. We are glad to report that a slight increase in regular attendance at the church on Sunday morning is noticed lately; if we were able to have every one who attends quite regularly altogether on one day, we would have a fair sized group. At Paddockwood our services continue as scheduled.

One of our community girls graduated from Niagara Christian College this spring as an academy senior. Our congratulations to Miss Jean Johnson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Johnson. Jean was a regular member of our Sunday School until she left three years ago this coming fall. We are expecting that another of our Sunday School girls will be taking Jean's place in school this fall and be company for Jean's younger sister, who has already spent a year there.

We have been helped in a material way again this past quarter. A quantity of foodstuffs consisting of milk, meat, cream, butter and other provisions have been donated by interested friends.

The evening of June 3 we took our girl Faye to Jones's, and Charlotte to McCalmons for a stay lasting almost two weeks. The next morning Sr. Calhoun, Sr. Brechbill, J. Albert and Leola, and the writer left North Star for Conference. This was our



first trip to Kansas. On the return trip we detoured west from western South Dakota and visited two days with Sr. Brechbill's brother near Moorecroft, Wyoming. We were unable to make North Star for the Sunday morning service as we had planned, but were at Delisle and in the afternoon drove to Paddockwood, reaching there in time for the evening service.

Shortly afterward preparations were under way for departure of Sr. Calhoun to Detroit. A farewell gathering was held for her at the mission home Sunday afternoon, June 24. The next Wednesday she left. Her service of twenty-two months brought many experiences to her, and her efforts and interest in behalf of the mission are deeply appreciated.

It has been six years ago this past Conference that we accepted our assignment to North Star Mission. The last six years have gone by rapidly and we never found life dull or monotonous. Changes have taken place during these years: perhaps noticed the most is the shift and change in population. There is hardly one left of the young people who were here when we came, and now another group of children are coming on and some are in the young people's group. The number of families in the district has declined somewhat. We do feel justified in saying that when we think of all these things, there has been progress made in the missionary work on this field. Much more we wish could have been done, and, indeed, should have been done. We would be the last to say that as workers and leaders, there have never been any where mistakes and errors made. We do have the satisfaction of knowing we did the best we knew to do at the time, and these past years have been a joy to us and a blessing as we have served Christ, the church, and our fellowmen here.

With the twelfth day of August we turn over our duties here to our successors, Bro. and Sr. Arthur Heise.

Through the *Visitor* columns this is the last quarterly report I shall have the privilege of writing for North Star. This time I want to thank all those who have supported us, both in the mission expenses, as well as by personal donations. Even though we are "Yankees" in Canada, our Canadian brethren and friends in various parts of Canada, did their best to make us feel at home, and we have felt at home. We will be saying "farewell" with sad and heavy hearts because there are still friends here who have not been converted. Pray with us that they might be saved before it is too late. Pray for us that God's plan will be further shown us as we face the future years, and again we solicit your prayers for the new workers as they lift the heavy load on their shoulders.

Chicago Mission, Chicago, Ill.

We would express our thanks to God, for His goodness to us this past quarter. God has been with us in our regular schedule of services. Every Sunday we see new faces in our congregation and some souls have sought God at an altar of prayer.

Open air meetings are held, with tract distribution, each Sunday preceding our evening service. It is interesting to see people sitting in their windows listening to the music as it comes from our loud speaker. Many Catholics live in the vicinity and are hungry, but are forbidden to come to the chapel.

Released time classes, with attendance of 75 from two schools, were held throughout the school year each Wednesday. It was our privilege to touch many lives who do not attend the Mission.

Summer Bible school was held for two weeks in July, three hours each morning, five days a week. Enrollment was 112 with average attendance of 82. From the standpoint of interest and accomplishment we felt this was our best school. A number of children definitely accepted Christ. Each child in two classes made a model of the tabernacle. In other classes missionary lessons were taught through projects made, such as an Indian village, et cetera. We were able to reach new families who now attend Sunday School.

Canadian visit. Sr. Carlson and I were asked by Bishop Edward Gilmore to visit the Churches in Ontario on behalf of Home Missions. In May we held fifteen services in twelve churches in as many days. It was interesting and inspiring to visit our Canadian brethren. We shall always remember their kindness and hospitality. Having spent many years in city mission work, it was of special interest to visit the home mission stations at Buffalo, Welland, and Houghton Center. In the latter place we spoke in the red brick church formerly used and owned by the Methodists, now owned by our church, purchased with gifts from local people. We heard of the many

years of faithful labors of Rev. and Mrs. John Nigh, followed by the great revival of 1932, when bootleggers and other wicked persons turned to God and are now active in the work of God. We stood at Brother Taylor's grave in the small cemetery near the church where he preached and the woods where he prayed and dedicated our lives anew to God and His service. His words, "I promised God I would stand in the gap and I meant it" still ring in our ears. We returned to our post in the big city with renewed courage and zeal to be true to God and souls regardless of the cost.

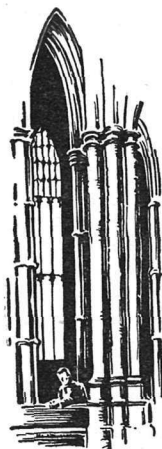
The following Tuesday night brought visible results. He came into the mission cleaned up and with a beaming countenance. It is truly a joy to hear his glowing testimony.
