Thus is recorded the striking words of the first gospel concerning Jesus and His works. We too are mindful of this that the multitudes of our day also need Jesus and His compassion; although today given through human instrumentality. We are endeavoring to so teach and preach the Lord Jesus that there will be those who will understand His compassion and also be healed.

During the past three months our activities have centered along these lines. Brother Walter Winger gave us two weeks of evangelistic preaching. His ministry of preaching and visitation was greatly appreciated. Particularly worthy of note was his address to the children in our local public school. Brother Arthur Heise of Paddockwood, Saskatchewan, was with us the first evening of the revival service which he shared with Brother Winger. Christ's Crusaders on alternate Sunday evenings are adding to the interest of the services by the use of local talent and by bringing in outside talent.

At an early date we expect to start a Boy's Club, the aim of which will be to give our boys a healthy and zestful recreational program that ties in with the church.

All in all we feel that the possibilities are tremendous but we wrestle not against flesh and blood but against the prince of the darkness of this world. Prevailing prayer is our greatest need. Will you pray with us and for us?

From Virginia, we extend Christian greetings to you, the readers of the Evangelical Visitor. Another quarter has slipped by and as we look back we surely must say that God has held our hand. This was His promise to us in Isaiah 41:13.

Our Rally Day service for the Sunday School was held the first Sunday in November. Our guests were Misses Anna Hess and Pauline Zarfoss formerly from Pennsylvania, but they are now living at Austinsville, Virginia. They give religious education in the public schools and have been living in this State for almost 13 years. They gave an object lesson and flannelgraph talk to the Sunday School, which was very interesting. There were two families in the community whose children were not attending any Sunday School. These children came for Rally Day and are now regular scholars. Our Sunday School attendance has picked up to 70-80 for which we are very thankful. Over half of this number are young people and children.

On November 26 we had a community Thanksgiving Service here at the church. The folk were encouraged to bring food and household supplies, to be placed around the altar. They responded very well, with the value of the produce estimated at \$30. A committee of three ladies, each representing a different denomination, distributed the "Thank-Offering" to needy families. Rev. C. J. Peyton, Pastor of the Pentecostal Holiness Church of Pulaski, Va., was our guest speaker. He is director of the radio program "Echoes of Faith" over our local station.

We are happy to tell you we have been able to shorten our bus route from a twenty mile round trip to an approximate five mile trip. This was made possible by the donation of a car by Brother Paul Martin. The Sylvatus worshipers are now able to provide their own transportation to services. This is a great help to us in a financial way, as the bus had to cross a mountain and ford two creeks. We are now better able to concentrate our efforts on our local people.

The Christmas season was a happy time here. After a short talk on the real meaning of Christmas, we had our exchange of gifts, also the Sunday School treat was given in the morning Sunday School session, December 21. It was a thrill to see these eager children receiving their gifts. Sunday night we had our Christmas program, attended by about 225 people. The highlight of the program was a play "Why Christmas," showing how four different types of families look at Christmas. One was a quarreling family, another a selfish family, third a family too busy to think of

others, and fourth a consecrated family who spent the holidays helping needy folk and singing Christmas carols. The skeptical "Old Man" in the play, viewed each family scene and was convinced by the fourth that after all he too needed to be a Christian. The question left to the audience was, "Which family does your home represent?"

Christmas Eve we had Prayer Meeting at 7:00 p.m. and a wedding here at the parsonage at 8:00 o'clock. Later that evening we took a group of young people and some parents caroling here in our community.

As most of 1953 lies before us untouched, we feel anew our dependance upon God. We as workers want to take Isaiah 41:10 with us throughout the year. We are commanded, "Fear thou not," and then the promise comes, "for I am with thee. Be not dismayed, for I am thy God. I will strengthen thee, yea I will help thee, yea I will uphold thee with the right hand of my righteousness."

over the air at our nightly street meetings, and while we do not have crowds standing around listening, yet it is gratifying to know how many have come into the hall as a result of hearing the singing and testimony on the street corner. And many of these have found their way to the altar of prayer and received definite help.

During the last three months there was a total attendance in the hall of 2,282, and of these 92 knelt at the altar for prayer. Only those who are definitely dealt with are counted, for there are those few who are not serious enough to really pray and seek the Lord. But those who are dealt with get the Gospel and the way of salvation made so plain to them that they can never say that they were not at the very threshold of the kingdom of God and could have stepped through the door into the family of God. Many take the step and testify to the change in their heart. They testify to the change in their heart. are then strongly exhorted to live the life which they have now begun. Whenever possible these men are visited in their room and instructed further and encouraged in the way of the Christian life. Some very happy hours have been spent in this way and it is tremendously encouraging to see the change that has come into their life and also in the appearance of their room.

The work among the children is very encouraging. Our Sunday School on Sunday afternoons is picking up in attendance and interest. The Christmas program given on the Sunday before Christmas was a blessing to everyone, and every seat was taken in the hall. It resulted in several new adult members in the school. One of the bright spots was the Sunday of Decision Day when ten children stepped out to accept Christ as their Saviour. This was during the week when Bishop Lady was with us. His presence and ministry were a real blessing to all.

The usual Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners in the Mission Home were times of real blessing and inspiring fellowship. These are occasions our Mission group will always remember.

At the close of Bishop Lady's week with us we had a baptismal service when a young man who had been converted in the Mission on August 31, was baptized.

Plans were on foot to relocate the Mission, but after spending much time looking around and investigating together with the Home Mission Board representative, we learned that we could continue in the same location. This appeared the thing to do as no suitable location could be found. It was finally arranged that we continue in the same location for another three years. The owner would be glad to sell the building, although he is not advertising. He is asking \$50,000. Now that we have arranged to continue in the same location, we are working on some repair and redecorating to make the hall more inviting, and to be able to push the work more vigorously.

HILE I am on my knees I realize What I can reach no greater efficiency in the pulpit than I reach in my daily living. I can be no more victorious a preacher than I am a victorious day-by-day Christian.

If I lift myself up toward Heaven in the preaching hour, and force outward indications to resemble piety, only to be defeated in my private heart, I am but stretching myself out of proportion; and that will lead to

frustration, and even cynicism sooner or later. Nor does it require outward sin to bring this divergence; just defeat in the heart is sufficient to bring ultimate defeat both to self and to purpose of life.

While I am on my knees, crying for liberty and anointing, I see so clearly that such come to one whose everyday life is anointed. Special unction for the occasion may come and go, but grace to live victoriously must be there always. The pulpit grace is no surer than the daily-living grace which undergirds it. Men do not put marble on top of cheap things, and God does not genuinely anoint in the pulpit those men whom He cannot anoint in daily living.

Search me, O God, and analyze my inner life; see if my daily-living grace is strong. If it is, well. And if it is not, then keep me on my knees until I can go forth conquering and to conquer in Jesus' Name. Amen and amen!-Herald of Holiness.
